Disability benefits

A disability benefit is a tax-free, financial payment to support your well-being.

The amount you receive depends on the degree to which your condition is related to your service (entitlement) and the severity of your condition, including its impact on your quality of life (assessment).

Do you qualify?

To qualify for adisability benefityou must be one of the following:

- •Canadian Armed Forces member or Veteran,
- •a current or former member of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police (RCMP),
- •Second World War or Korean War Veteran (includes Merchant Navy), or
- •certain civilians who served in the Second World War.

You should apply for a disability benefit if you:

- 1.have a diagnosed medical condition or disability; and
- 2.are able to show that the condition is related to your service.

If you qualify for a disability benefit, you will receive either a:

- 1.Pain and suffering compensation *- a life-time monthly benefit or lump sum benefit the choice is yours.
 - •View the pain and suffering compensation rates.
 - •<u>View all</u>Pain and Suffering Compensation FAQs.

or

2.Disability pension **- a life-time monthly benefit. If you have any dependents (e.g. spouse, common-law partner and/or children), your monthly amount will be increased.

View the disability pension rates.

*If you have a pending application for a disability benefit and were expecting to receive a disability award, you do not need to re-apply. Your application for a disability benefit will now be processed as Pain and Suffering Compensation.

**A disability pension is provided if you served with the Canadian Armed Forces (CAF) in the Second World War or Korean War. For other CAF service, a disability pension is provided in relation to any application prior to April 1, 2006.

Service Officers with The Royal Canadian Legion or The War Amps of Canada can also assist you with your application, including helping you get all of the information you need to support your application. Their assistance is free of charge.

Disability pension corrective payment

If you received a benefit from VAC between 2003 and 2010 and it was under the Pension Act, you may receive a corrective payment because of a discrepancy in our calculations. Most payments are automatic, however, Please contact us at 1-866-522-2122 if:

- •You no longer receive a benefit from VAC, or
- •You represent the estate of a deceased recipient.

If you are legally entitled to inherit assets from the estate of a deceased recipient, you mayapply to receive a corrective paymentif you are eligible.

Reviews and appeals

If you do not agree with the decision made regarding your application for disability benefits, you may request a Departmental review. Learn more about<u>reviews and appeals</u>.

Reassessment

If the disability for which you are receiving VAC benefits worsens and medical evidence can show this change in your condition, you can request a reassessment. If the reassessment confirms that your condition has worsened, your disability benefit, will be adjusted accordingly – unless you are already receiving the maximum amount of the benefit. To request a reassessment, your first step should be tocall us or visit your local VAC office.

Tools for Adjudication

<u>Eligibility Entitlement Guidelines</u> – These guidelines are current medical and scientific descriptions of known injuries and diseases related to service.

<u>Table of Disabilities</u> – This table helps the adjudicator assess the level of impairment and the impact that impairment has on your quality of life.

Related programs

<u>Critical injury benefit</u>- A one-time payment that recognizes the immediate impact of the most severe and traumatic service-related injuries or diseases.

<u>Rehabilitation services</u>- Services to improve your health and adjust to life after service.

<u>Clothing allowance</u>- Monthly payments if you need new or special clothing due to your health issues.

<u>Treatment Benefits</u>- Coverage for medical and health related services.

<u>Benefits for survivors</u> – Financial support or compensation for the survivors of a disability pensioner or of a member or Veteran who died in service or as a result of a service-related illness or injury.

<u>Financial advice</u>- If you receive a lump-sum payment more than 5% of the current maximum, we can pay up to \$500 for professional advice to help you manage your money effectively.

<u>Additional pain and suffering compensation</u>- Monthly payments in recognition of any severe and permanent disability, related to your military service, which creates a barrier to life after service.

Programs related to a disability pension:

<u>Attendance allowance</u>- Monthly payments for a disability pensioner whose health needs require daily personal care support.

<u>Exceptional incapacity allowance</u>- Monthly payments if your illness or injury impacts your quality of life.

NATO NEWS AND THOUGHTS [From SHELLDRAKE] 19 November 2021.

A Veterans Affairs Canada Deputy Ministers (Paul Ledwell, Deputy Minister) Coffee Group meeting was held via a virtual platform on 18 November. Our National President attended and will report in next weeks "Media Report". The main issue continues to be long wait times for processing of Veteran claims. This continues to be a major irritant for Veterans.

Concerns over Russian troops. Ukraine's Western allies have warned that Russia is massing

troops on the Ukrainian border. U.S. Secretary of State Antony Blinken said on Friday 12 November that Washington was "very concerned about some of the irregular movements of forces that we see on Ukraine's border." Meanwhile, Ukraine received the fourth delivery of supplies – 80 tons of ammunition – from the United States as part of a \$60 million aid package promised to Kyiv in August

Reaching out to NATO.Poland, Lithuania and Latvia are considering triggering Article 4 of theNATO treaty, which allows member states to ask for consultations if they feel their territorial integrity, political independence or security is threatened, amid an influx of migrants coming across theBelarusian border. The Polish prime minister on Sunday called on NATO to take "concrete steps" toaddress the issue. The EU foreign affairs chief confirmed on Monday that the bloc would imposesanctions against Belarus targeting the Minsk airport and other facilities and hotels hosting migrants

Inconceivable. Australian Defense Minister Peter Dutton said it was inconceivable that Australiawould decline to help the U.S. defend Taiwan in the event of an attack. It's the latest in a series ofhints from the U.S. and its allies of a willingness to go to bat for the self-ruled island. It comes on theheels of similar comments from the U.S. secretary of state and president that the U.S. may be larifying its commitments to Taipei. Australia and Japan, meanwhile, are continuing to deepennaval interoperability.

Russian delivery. Russia has started delivering components of the S-400 air defense system to India ahead of Russian President Vladimir Putin's visit next month. Delivery of the first division of the system is set to be completed by the end of 2021. India purchased the unit in 2018 for \$5.4 billion.

Veterans Independence Program

THIS PROGRAM CAN HELP VETERANS WITH SNOW REMOVEL AND GRASS CUTTNG

About this program

The Veterans Independence Program provides annual tax-free funding for services such as grounds maintenance, housekeeping, meal preparation, personal care, and professional health and support services.

This program does not replace other federal, provincial or municipal programs. Instead, it is intended to work with those programs to help meet your needs.

Note: If you think you may have a need for these services, be sure to complete the Veterans Independence Program application at the same time as your Pain and Suffering Compensation application. If approved, this will allow you to access support at the earliest possible date.

Do you qualify?

You should apply for the Veterans Independence Program if you need home care services and you:

- •have qualified for a disability benefit, or
- •have qualified for the War Veterans Allowance, or
- •receive Prisoner of War Compensation, or
- •are eligible for, but can't access, a Contract Bed (also known as a Priority Access Bed) in a long term care facility.

Services covered by VIP funding include:

- •Grounds maintenance (can include snow removal, lawn mowing, etc.)
- •Housekeeping (can include assistance with cleaning, laundry, meal preparation, errands, etc.)
- •Access to nutrition (e.g. meal delivery services)
- •Professional healthcare and support (nursing services, occupational therapy, assessments, etc.)
- Personal care
- •Ambulatory healthcare (assessments, diagnostics, activities and transportation to these services)
- •Transportation (transportation to social or community activities)
- Long term care
- •Home adaptations (contribution towards modifications to the Veteran's principal residence that are necessary for the Veteran to carry out everyday activities).

Related programs

<u>Disability Benefit</u>: Compensation to recognize that your injury or illness is a result of your military service.

War Veterans Allowance: Monthly payments if you have a low household income.

<u>Prisoner of War Compensation</u>: Monthly compensation if you were taken prisoner or detained by enemy forces.

Attendance Allowance: Monthly payments if your health needs require personal care support.

<u>Veterans Independence Program for survivors</u>: As a surviving spouse, you may qualify for help to remain independent in your home.

<u>Veterans Independence Program for primary caregiver</u>: You may qualify for help to remain independent in your home.

Frequently asked questions

What is the fastest way to apply for VIP services?

The fastest way to apply is by using My VAC Account.

I am currently living outside of Canada, can I still receive my VIP benefits?

Unfortunately, Veterans Independence Program payments can only be provided to you when you are residing in Canada.

Can I choose any provider of services?

You may obtain services from the provider of your choice.

How is my housekeeping/grounds maintenance grant calculated?

The housekeeping and grounds maintenance grants are calculated based on your level of need and the going rate for these services in your area, up to allowable maximum amount. These rates are determined by a review of costs for these services across the country, including the labour market index. This national rate table shows the going rates payable by geographic area.

What is a "Benefit Year"? Do my benefits have an end date?

We create one-year arrangements for VIP benefits, however this does not mean that your benefits will stop after one year. Your benefits will continue for as long as you need them. The one-year arrangement is a mechanism we use to help manage your support. However, if your health needs or other circumstances change at any time, please contact us.
