Caregiver Recognition Benefit

About this program

Having a disability sometimes means you need ongoing care to remain in your home. The Caregiver Recognition Benefit recognizes the important role a caregiver delivers on a day-to-day basis by providing them with a tax free, monthly benefit.

Do you qualify?

You should apply for the Caregiver Recognition Benefit if:

- you have a VAC Disability Award or Pain and Suffering Compensation;*
- you need ongoing care as a result of the physical, mental or cognitive health condition(s) for which your Disability Award or Pain and Suffering Compensation was approved;
- you need one of the following:
 - a level of care and supervision consistent with admission to an institution;
 - daily physical assistance or ongoing direction and supervision for at least four of your activities of daily living (See: <u>What are activities of daily living?</u>); or
 - o daily supervision and are not safe when left alone;
- your caregiver is over the age of 18, plays an essential role in providing or coordinating your ongoing care, and is unpaid;
- you are not a permanent resident of a nursing home or long-term care facility; and,
- you are a former Canadian Armed Forces member.
- * If you have a disability pension (or POW compensation) of 1% or more, you could receive this support through the <u>Attendance allowance</u>.

How to apply

Before you apply

As part of your application, your caregiver will be asked to attest to providing you care, provide proof of identity (e.g. driver's license), and sign the application.

Fill out the application form with your caregiver. Both of you must sign the form.

To receive this benefit, you may be requested to participate in an additional health assessment. We will contact you if this is required.

You can expect a decision within eight weeks of submitting your application. If approved, your caregiver will begin to receive the benefit within nine weeks.

Apply online

If you're registered for My VAC Account, you can apply online using the web form, which makes applying easier. If you aren't registered, you can <u>register</u> now.

Please note: you must inform VAC if your needs or circumstances change.

VAC may also review or re-assess your situation once you're in the program.

If your caregiver changes, you need to inform us as soon as possible and you will need to submit a new application.

Related programs

<u>Caregiver Zone</u> - Online support and resources for those who care for Veterans.

<u>VAC Assistance Program</u> – Get support right now from a mental health professional by calling 1-800-268-7708.

<u>Peer Support</u> - There are peer support networks for members or Veterans of the CAF or the RCMP living with an operational stress injury (OSI).

<u>LifeSpeak</u> - LifeSpeak is a self-help website with videos and information about mental health, nutrition and more.

<u>Pastoral Outreach</u> - Spiritual support when Veterans or their families are dealing with end of life issues or bereavement.

<u>Disability Benefit</u> - Compensation for your service-related injury or illness.

<u>Attendance allowance</u> - Monthly payments if your health needs require personal care support.

<u>Additional Pain and Suffering Compensation</u> - Monthly payments if you are experiencing barriers to establishment in life after service due to a service-related permanent and severe impairment.

Disability tax credit (DTC)

The DTC helps reduce the income tax that people with physical or mental impairments, or their supporting family members, may have to pay. It aims to offset some of the costs related to the impairment. Learn more about this non-refundable tax credit available through the <u>Canada Revenue Agency</u>.

Legion of Honour

In 2014, to mark the 70th anniversary of the invasion of Normandy, the French government began the process of honouring Canadians who participated in assisted with the liberation of France. To date, nearly 1,200 Canadian veterans have received the French National Order of the Legion of Honour. As France prepares to mark the 80th anniversary of D-Day next year, the country is working with the Canadian government to identify more veterans who qualify for the honour.
